Digital Equity Project Timeline – Year 1

January-February: Meet with existing stakeholders to inform this initiative







October-December: Begin the piloting process







March-April:

Identify and develop an exhaustive list of assets

September-October: Develop train-the-trainer toolkit

Digital Equity Project Timeline – Year 2

January-March:

Hire and train sixteen master digital navigators

May-August:

Develop outreach materials, such as mobile teaching toolkits, to drive awareness of digital navigators and education strategies

Ongoing through Y1-2:

Identify sustainability strategies












March-May: Host trainings for community lay leaders

August-October:

Create screening and referral pathways to connect people to resources, devices, and digital navigators

Measure	Pre-training (n=60)	Post-training (n=53)	Paired Test
Comfort	3.03 (.97)	4.35 (.58)	t(54) = 110.65, p. <.001
Competence	2.63 (.97)	4.24 (.58)	t(51) + -9.78, p < .001
Confidence	3.67 (1.15)	4.53 (.57)	t(51) = -5.19, p<.001





- Increase funding for HCCBG provider agencies to integrate core programs with population health initiatives and interact directly with healthcare systems
- Convene Senior Hunger Summit to develop vision and strategic steps to further integrate and improve access to enhanced nutrition for older adults in need
- Increase funding for Adult Protective Services (APS) staff, so county departments of social services can reduce case backlogs and employee burnout

- Maintain APS Essential Services Fund (ESF) to provide vulnerable older adults with food, housing, medications/medical care, and other basic needs; convert time-limited ESF funding to recurring state funding with a 10% match from county departments of social services
- **Update outdated APS statutes** to improve service, consistency of practice, and community stakeholder engagement and education
- Address hearing loss in long-term care facilities by funding formal, structured screening, evaluation and treatment and by educating staff regarding working with residents with deafness/hearing loss

- Address digital equity for older adults by funding statewide initiative engaging partners such as NC Department of Information Technology's Division of Broadband and Digital Equity, DAAS, AAAs, NC State Extension. Update: since report was finalized DAAS was awarded \$1.12 million to address digital equity
- Expand the number of PACE Programs (Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly) and increase capacity of existing PACE programs with additional funding
- Integrate health and human services organizations in a value-based payment system, using Healthy Opportunities pilot programs as model

- Address long-term care (LTC) workforce crisis through efforts such as
 - retaining enhanced Medicaid pandemic rates
 - loan forgiveness and grant programs for LTC nurses and other direct care staff
 - measures to recruit, train and retain health sciences educators who prepare students for LTC careers
 - incentives to retain LTC staff such as childcare vouchers and family leave provisions
 - targeted recruiting immigrants
 - studying and amending state policies and regulations that inhibit LTC staff recruitment, training and retention

• Strengthen and expand options for older people in need of care by enhancing Medicaid in-home coverage, expanding PACE program, developing Medicaid palliative care policy, and ensuring the Medicaid Estate Recovery Program criteria don't unnecessarily restrict Medicaid eligible individuals from seeking care

Senior Tar Heel Legislature Priorities

- Allocate additional \$8M in recurring funds for Adult Protective Services (APS) to address staff shortages
- Increase Senior Center General Purpose appropriation by \$1,265,316 in recurring funds
- Allocate additional \$8M in recurring funds for HCCBG
- Allocate additional \$1.5M in recurring funds for 11 additional longterm care ombudsmen
- Strengthen long-term care staffing standards
