APS in North Carolina


- Serve adults with disabilities that are vulnerable to abuse, neglect and exploitation
- Protect vulnerable adults by evaluating reports to determine whether disabled adults need protective services
- Work with vulnerable adults and families to identify and prevent abuse, neglect and exploitation
- Report evidence of mistreatment to the District Attorney and various regulatory agencies
- Initiate court action as necessary to protect the adult
- Mobilize essential services on behalf of adults through community collaboration

Role of County DSS vs. Role of DHHS

N.C. General Statute


- 108A-102(a) Duty to report
 - -Any person having reasonable cause to believe that a disabled adult is in need of protective services shall report such information to the director.
- 108A-103(a) Duty of director upon receiving report
 - -Any director receiving a report that a disabled adult is in need of protective services shall make a prompt and thorough evaluation to determine whether the disabled adult is in need of protective services and what services are needed.







- The Team is comprised of state and county leaders




